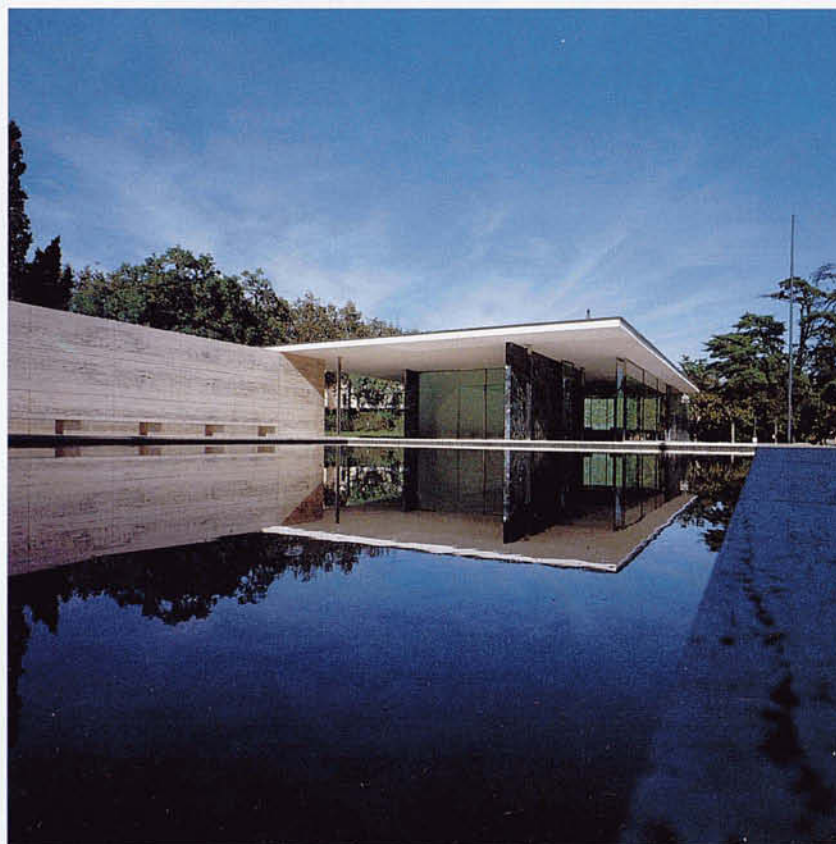

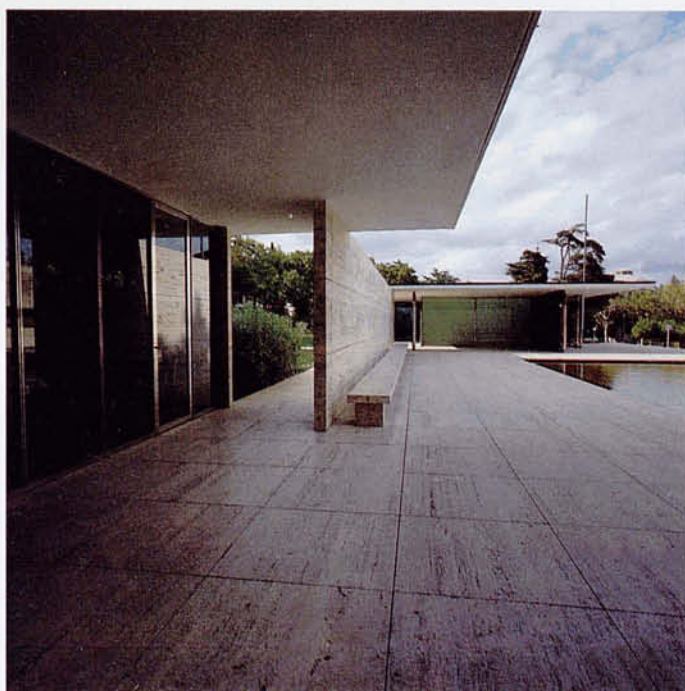
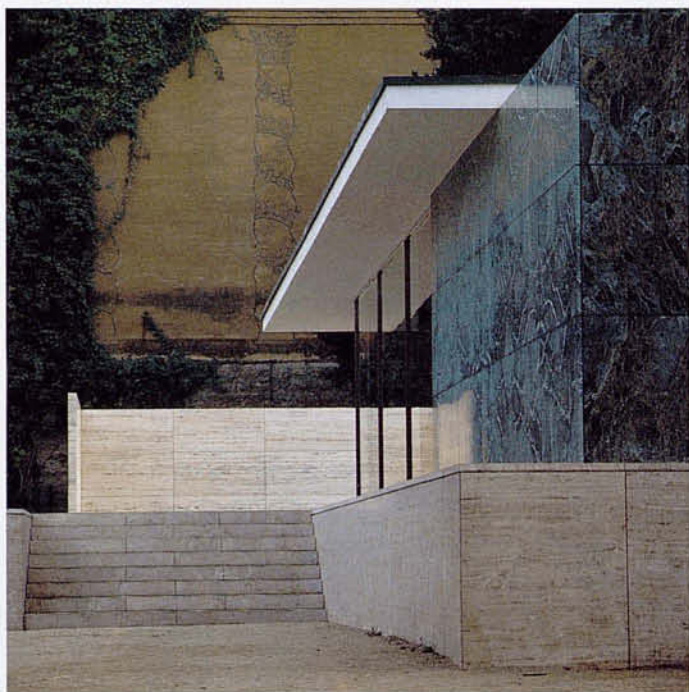


**In 1928, the Weimar Republic gave Mies van der Rohe the job of designing the German Pavilion for the 1929 Barcelona International Fair. The building was intended as a place to hold receptions while the Fair lasted, and was therefore demolished barely eight months after it had been built. However, it has gone down in the history of twentieth century architecture as a landmark in modern design.**

**In 1986, the centenary of the great architect's birth, the Pavilion was faithfully reconstructed in its original site. At the foot of the hill of Montjuïc, close to the Miró Foundation, the *Palau Nacional*, the Barcelona trade-fair centre and the future Olympic sports complex, it is a must for all those who want to understand the capital of Catalonia and get the most out of their visit.**
